ACCOUNTABLE - We are responsible to each other and the community to ensure ethical leadership in all levels of the organization.


NOBLE - We are privileged to serve a proud community through a profession with high ideals and strong moral character.

ABOUT US

THE BEGINNING: Law Enforcement in Beloit began in 1857 with the creation of a Justice of the Peace, a Sheriff and two Constables. The population of Beloit was 1,678, and the town was growing with the papermaking industry and establishment of Beloit College. In 1880, the Police Department was called the "Anti Horse-Thief Association" as this must have been one of the biggest concerns of residents! In 1902, a Police and Fire Commission was formed and the Marshal replaced by a Chief of Police. In 1940, the department had two police cars and 31 men, who earned about \$100 a month. There were 4 walking beats, and they worked 6 days and then had 2 days off. The 1950s saw many changes with the acquisition of an ambulance that was operated by Police Officers and our first teletype unit, allowing vehicle and people checks in a short period of time.

TODAY: Currently, the Beloit Police Department has an authorized sworn staff of 74 officers and 21 non-sworn staff. The Department serves the Beloit community with a population of 36,925 and 16.4 square miles. The Department is a leading agency in using honorable and progressive policing to create safe neighborhoods and connect with community on a personal level. We are also a leading agency in the recruitment of highly qualified employees that represent our community.

HIRING & RECRUITMENT

The Beloit Police Department has a committed Assessment and Recruitment Team of supervisors and officers devoted to recruiting and assessing individuals to meet the needs of the community and our agency. It is through these efforts our department has been able to hire qualified law enforcement officers and continue to make our agency representative of the community we serve.



CHAPLAIN PROGRAM

In 2023, our department resurrected the Chaplain Program which consists of six area clergy members who volunteer their time to provide support to victims and/or witnesses of crimes or accidents, as well as Department members. One chaplain is on call at all times to provide assistance and support for victims at critical incidents and difficult death notices.

Aside from their initial training in May 2023, and monthly chaplain meetings, they also attended seven (7) community events, participated in thirteen (13) ridealongs, and reported to nine (9) calls for service in 2023. The chaplains have quickly become a very important part of our department.

CO-RESPONDER PROGRAM

Beloit Police Department entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with Rock County Human Services Department in 2023. Rock County Human Service Department will provide a Crisis Worker for 40 hours per week to perform on-scene assessments as requested by our department, document all activities per RCHSD policies, facilitate outreach and early intervention efforts in coordination with our department, attend Beloit Police Department briefings, participate with Beloit Police Department's Crisis Intervention Team (CIT), and attend supervision and staff meetings through the Rock County Human Services Department's Crisis Services Unit. The Crisis Worker will respond with law enforcement personnel to assist individuals in mental health crisis when possible.

DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2023

Attendees wore their Halloween costumes and had the opportunity to see first responder vehicles and visit with officers from several local law enforcement agencies.

DECEMBER 2023 - Our Department partnered with several local agencies to present Heroes' Holiday, a free community celebration, on December 15. The event included horse-drawn carriage rides, candle light hikes, visits with Santa, refreshments, and more.
